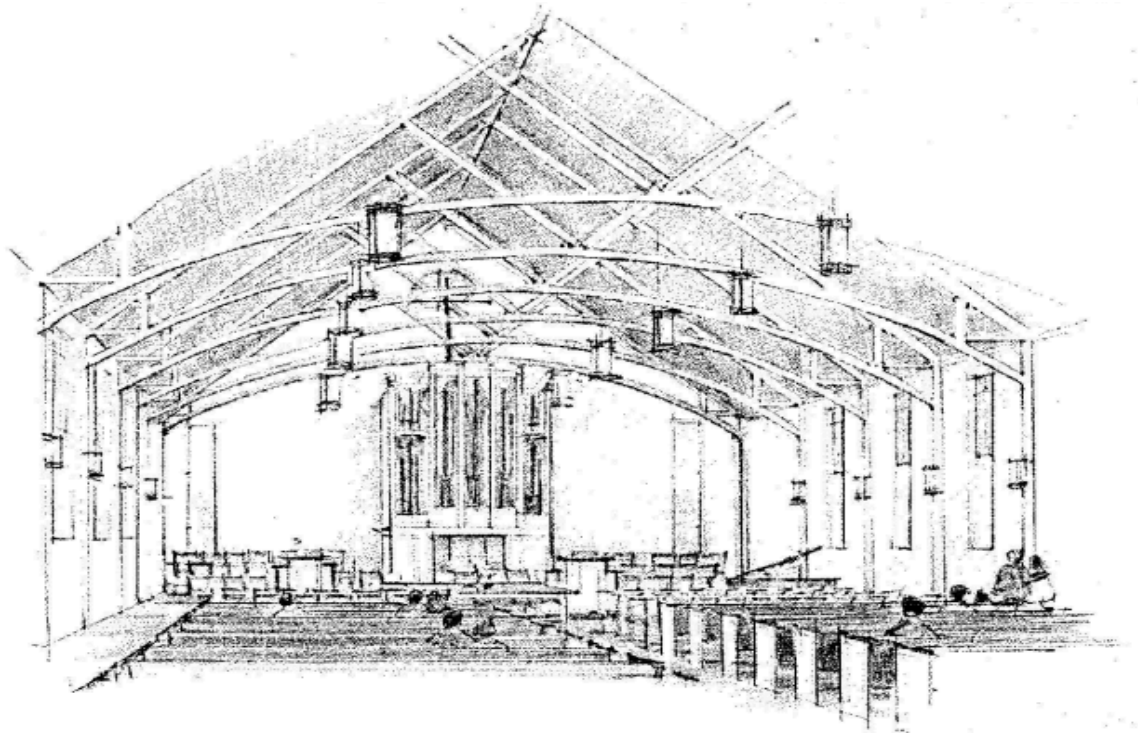

# Buildings & Grounds

Our team of Chris Jones, Sonny Kern, and Jim Dormer have ensured that we continue to work within our budget while delivering oversight and improvements in the overall use of the church facilities. This past year we have:

- Improved congregant hearing capabilities with use of headphones, and also provided successful testing of pew amplifiers.
- Contracted with the Norwalk River Rowing Association to rent our basement for training purposes.
- Finalized vendors for shading some of the windows in the sanctuary. Project currently on hold.
- Partnered with St. Matthew's to investigate solar for the site. Doesn't look like a viable project.
- Improved sound, quality and control, specifically regarding music, for streaming broadcasts.
- Executed a project in the sanctuary to install new panels behind the choir risers. This allows us to store all service chairs and other service items safely inconveniently.

For 2026 our focus will be on:

Furthering the shade project as needed, painting as needed, live voice, and music, recording improvements, and keeping the sanctuary basement clear of clutter.

Also, although primarily focused on our youth programs and Confirmation, Julie Fowler continues to provide crucial assistance with our annual youth-led worship "favorites," including the Christmas Pageant and Youth Sunday, for which we are always appreciative and grateful! ## Faith Formation

We began the year with a 3 part Lenten series called “With These Hands,” in which we learned new art forms together: knitting (led by Irla Landry), bread baking (Sandy Shifrin and Sonny Kern) and drumming (Dr. Rodney Loren). We remembered God’s promise to breathe new life into us, showing us how to turn nothing into something.

In the fall, we led a book study on Richard Rohr’s *The Tears of Things*, over three well attended dinner discussions (15 people). We learned how the prophets responded with lament, anger and eventually compassion to the outrages of their day, and discussed how we too can live compassionately in a time of violence and despair. Each pastor led one study.

Finally, over a weekend in late October, Rev. Jessica, Becky Shroyer and Cathy Thomas led an overnight women’s retreat for the second year, this time with 21 participants, an increase from 13 last year. Our theme was *Sharing Sacred Stories: Love over Fear*. Based on 2 Timothy 1:3-7: “God did not give us a spirit of fear, but of power, love and self-discipline.” The weekend included prayer, sharing, campfire singing, meditation, and connecting with each other. We were thrilled to welcome our very own Kathy Caprino, a top-rated women’s career, leadership and personal growth coach and speaker, as our guest speaker.

## Faith In Action

The Faith in Action Committee continued its evolution in 2025, building on the momentum from 2024’s shift back toward hands-on ministry while maintaining our commitment to strategic financial support for area organizations.

Our monthly meal service with Open Door Norwalk, initiated in fall 2024, ran through June 2025. While the project was impactful, it did not resonate with the congregation and we discontinued it in June. We continued our longstanding support of critical community organizations through financial contributions, including Rise Against Hunger, Wilton Social Services, Wilton Youth Council, Presbyterian Promise, and Midnight Run.

In May, we partnered with Pacific House for a Wild Goose Sunday service making blankets for shelter residents. In November, we partnered with Open Door Shelter for sandwich kit making. Both services included speakers who shared about their work serving those experiencing homelessness, providing our congregation with meaningful education about and connection to local mission work. We also collected donated food at Septemberfest for delivery to Open Door.

This fall, we initiated a twice-yearly service commitment with Wilton Social Services, preparing lunch to Ogden House seniors in October and February. We are also beginning discussions about a possible church-wide mission trip and continue to engage with parishioners to imagine new ways to serve God’s people. We are always ready to have new folks join us-- please reach out to Rev. Chris or FIA Chair Patti Dormer if you would like to participate, or have any mission ideas! We are excited about the year ahead!

## Music

The Music Ministry of Wilton Presbyterian Church exists to enrich worship and support the church's outreach through meaningful and inspiring music. Volunteers and staff work together to thoughtfully integrate music into each service, enhancing the congregation's spiritual experience and encouraging full participation in worship.

The Chancel Choir rehearses weekly and offers an anthem each Sunday, carefully selected to reflect the theme of the service and to strengthen congregational singing in hymns and responses. The Handbell Choir contributes seasonally, most often during Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter, adding a unique and joyful dimension to worship.

### Highlights from 2025

- March: Taizé-style service for Ash Wednesday
- April: Easter worship featuring the Chancel Choir, Handbells, Brass, and Organ
- May: Joint concert with St. Matthew's Choir presenting Schubert's *Mass in G*, Haydn's *Te Deum in C*, and Mozart's *Regina Coeli* (K.276)
- September: Second Annual Choir Retreat, introducing new music for the fall and winter seasons
- November: Guest flutist Lauren Tate accompanied the choir anthem *All We Are Belongs to You*. Guest cellist accompanied the choir anthem *For Everyone Born*
- December 5: "Good Time Girls" Cabaret in the Parish Hall
- December 14: *Festival of Music* featuring the Handbell Choir, Chancel Choir, and guest instrumentalists
- December 24:
  - 4:00 p.m. service with Chancel Choir and Brass
  - 10:00 p.m. service featuring a Jazz Trio (bass, guitar, flute/clarinet) and vocal soloists
- Incorporation of drumming ensembles into worship services
- Performance of 41 different choral anthems throughout the year
- Handbell Choir presented four voluntaries

### Ministry Notes and Operations

- The Chancel Choir welcomed several part-time singers during the holiday season.
- The Handbell Choir added one new ringer to the ensemble.
- Twenty-five new choral anthems were added to the music library.
- Music stand lights were purchased for the Handbell Choir.
- Ongoing tuning and maintenance of the piano and organ were completed.
- Music was regularly arranged, composed, and edited to best support available instruments and vocal forces.

Music ministry continues to play a vital role in engaging worship, expressing the depth of faith beyond words, and serving as a powerful tool for community outreach. In the coming months, we look forward to expanding opportunities for musical participation, welcoming both members of the congregation and the wider community.

## Stewardship

With learning from the 2025 campaign, 2026 Stewardship was launched during worship on 10/5/25 - Gather for Good. Approximately 85 packets were mailed/distributed by 10/7/25.

The operating budget was represented by 4 broad pillars. Each pillar was presented over 4 concurrent Sundays in October:

10/5 – Worship (and launch of the Gather for Good campaign)  
10/12 – Outreach  
10/19 – Physical Space  
10/26 - Adults, Children & Families  
11/2 – DEDICATION of pledges

A video was created which explained the theme, the pillars and the percentage they each represented of our 2026 operating budget.

In a nutshell: Pledging participation is down overall (on a purely numerical basis), but the average pledge has increased significantly! We did not meet our (admittedly "stretch") goal, but (as of 1/21) are still almost at the same spot as last year, despite a number of those pledging moving away and (sadly) passing away this past year.

Some other learnings:

Earlier is better for Stewardship, and October seemed to be great timing this past year.

It seems we may need to emphasize the pledge deadline more firmly(?) to assist with follow-ups and to give the Finance Committee ample time to plan the budget.

Awesome things are happening at WPC, and what may be the most effective way to increase the resources we have to continue our ministry, is to invite more people to participate!

## Technology

This year, we continued to find ways to improve our sound control capabilities, testing out a variety of ways to provide amplification to those with hearing challenges, and eventually settling on small speakers, which a generous donor has provided us the funds to purchase. We also have returned to offering our worship livestream, and have improved the sound for our broadcast significantly. We have also added the latest Bluetooth broadcast technology, so that the service sound can be received and amplified in a number of ways in the physical sanctuary space. This year, we will make available instructions for people with some hearing aids to be able to directly connect to our sound system for worship. We also added an iPad for wireless control and adjustment of sound in the Sanctuary. This year, due to the installation of some panels on either side of the organ (to assist us in providing much-needed storage space), we will need to revise how we implement video in worship, as the walls we previously used with our projectors are no longer accessible. More to come!

## WEPCO

WEPCO (Wilton Episcopal Presbyterian Corporation) works on behalf of both Wilton Presbyterian Church and St. Matthews Episcopal Church. WEPCO is responsible for maintaining the shared spaces at the church complex to include the outdoor grounds and all indoor spaces excluding both sanctuaries. The Upper Core, the Lounge, the Parish Hall and all church school spaces are examples of the 15,000 square feet complex WEPCO maintains. WEPCO functions via operating and capital budgets approved each year by both churches.

Financially, WEPCO continues to remain diligent about monitoring all operating expenses. In addition to the \$20,000 operating capital approved by churches annually, WEPCO relies on rental income through contracted renters (Lower Core groups: Belden Hill Montessori school and Flat Vernacular wallpaper company, as well as Kiwanis, Wilton Singers, and seven AA – A New Life groups). WEPCO also relies on one-off rentals from various groups within Wilton and surrounding towns.

WEPCO continues to attract multiple Indian Cultural, non for profit, and social groups for larger scale one-off event rentals.

### CAPITAL PROJECTS

**Non-Operating Capital:** In 2025, WEPCO completed two-bathroom renovations to include new commercial grade LVT floors, toilets, vanity mirrors, painted walls and stalls, and wall accessories.

The budget for this initiative was \$30,000 split by churches, and \$29,020 was spent.

Total Non-Operating Capital spent in 2025 - \$29,020.

**Operating Capital:** In 2025, WEPCO ended the year with a net surplus of \$5,453.

**Some things of note:**

- Additional Revenue:
  - The current Burns Construction lease expires in May 2026 with the possibility it may be renewed for some period of time. Also, there was an increase in Burns revenue due to the increase in the contract by \$1,500/month 7-months totaling \$10,500. This was not contemplated in the 2025 Budget.
  - Rental income came in over budget by \$5,238 or 27%.
- Expenses Under budget:
  - Payroll came in at \$5,700 under budget.
  - Contracts are under budget by \$1,940 primarily because WEPCO did not need to replace any fire extinguishers during inspection this year which saved \$1,200.
  - General Repairs – Non-HVAC came in under budget by \$2,081.
- Expense Over budget:
  - Fuel Oil came in over budget by \$5,000.
  - Snow Plowing / Parking Lot Maintenance was over budget by \$6,950
  - Landscaping was over budget by \$5,593
  - Refuse expense was over budget by \$1,727
- Capital Projects:
  - Non-Operating Capital Projects – The bathroom renovations cost \$29,020 and it was allocated \$30k. There is a remaining balance of \$980.
  - Total Cost of Operating Capital Projects - \$21,766:
    - Various HVAC Repairs - \$10,710
    - Fan Coil Project - \$4,380
    - Commercial Floor Scrubber - \$1,999
    - Lamppost Project - \$3,852
    - Piano Acquisition - \$825
    - Donation to Wepco- cost to deliver

For 2025, there is a surplus of funds as follows:

Net Surplus from Operating Budget	\$ 5,453
NON-Operating Capital funds	\$ 980
Operating Capital funds	\$ 6,076
Total 2025 Excess	\$12,509

**OTHER**

As mentioned, Burns Construction lease has been extended through May 2026. Upon expiration of this lease, Burns has agreed to re-pave the entire parking lot allowing WEPCO to avoid a major cost.

The Spring and Sumer 2025 Clean-Up Days were only successful because of the strong Scout turn out and additional expenses would have been incurred without the level of Scout participation. Parishioners from both congregations are continually encouraged to join the Scouts in this tremendous effort of maintaining our beautiful campus.

We are extremely grateful for Susan Wilson, Avalon Consulting, Inc. and the meticulous management of WEPCO financials.

Thank you to the entire WEPCO Board of Directors, the Clergy, the Staff, WPC Session, and St. Matthew's Vestry along with parishioners of both churches for their continued support in keeping our complex a special place for missions of faith and service to the broader community.

## **Youth and Family Ministry**

### **Confirmation**

WPC confirmed thirteen very dedicated and committed youth in 2025. Marcus Bassani, Lily Blessing, Kennedy Cubba, Brady Fowler, Vincenzo Luchenta, Gabriella Memoli, Graham Monteleone, Nina Pagano, Grayson Richards, Kayla Rwabukamba, Peggy Stofega, Charlie Tate and Catie Watkinson questioned and served their way through their year of discernment. They participated in a special Maundy Thursday Service reading scripture at the annual Deacon hosted dinner. The annual Confirmand led Midnight Run facilitated by Ralph Bernabei brought them together as they provided outreach through conversation and provisions to those living in homelessness in NYC. Within this program is the importance of sharing time with our brothers and sisters in faith and interfaith families. Our annual trip to OLF and Temple B'Nai Chaim serves as an opportunity to experience how others worship God. At the conclusion of their confirmation portion of their journey together, collectively they presented their thoughtful Statements of Faith to the congregation and were warmly welcomed as new members by the congregation.

### **Youth Group Ministry**

WPC continues to offer a safe place for our Middle School, to gather for a time of fun, faithful fellowship. Through service with The Open Door Shelter, Rise Against Hunger, Caroling and delivering the Give A Smile bags, the group began to live out the ways we are the hands and feet of God. Meetings designed with a fun message provide for a safe space with which to bring up hard or confusing questions while receiving support from peers.

WPC high school youth remain very invested and dedicated to mission opportunities. Their statements of faith are lived out through their commitment and participation in Midnight Run, Rise Against Hunger, Rake N Roll and serving as liturgists from time to time. Study breaks and luncheon discussion offerings provide opportunities to gather in fellowship remaining close as a church family. This past year marked the return of WPC's annual DC Mission trip serving the unhoused and those living with food insecurity. We are so happy to be up and running in fellowship on this trip!
